Updating COVID-19 Protocols for Schools

In Governor Holcomb's COVID-19 press conference Wednesday, it was announced that the Indiana Department of Health



(IDOH) is making changes to COVID-19 protocols for schools regarding quarantine guidance. No changes are to take place before Monday, Feb. 8.

The preliminary information will lessen quarantine requirements, but there are several exceptions such as when exposure occurs in situations such as lunch or athletic activities. *Continued on p. 3*

Read to the Final Four

Third graders from Neil Armstrong and Waverly have qualified for the Read to the Final Four reading competition sponsored by the NCAA and the Indiana Sports Corp.

Third graders across the state were challenged to read enough minutes to qualify for the comptition. Through April, the 68 qualifying schools across the state will compete to see who can read the most minutes.

From Nov. 20 to Jan. 27, Neil Armstrong students read a total of 59,147 minutes and Waverly read 19,088 to qualify. Neil Armstrong will compete against Centeron Elementary, and Waverly will compete against Woodbrook Elementary this week. Competitions are weighted based on the number of students reading. The schools will learn Monday if they advance in their brackets.

a full-sized bus to pass another vehicle on a country road where snow is piled up on the sides, temperature with wind chill, and many other factors. We also receive information from highway departments, police agencies, and neighboring school systems.

Members of our transportation department are in early to make sure buses are cleared off and ready to go. We also have maintenance and custodial personnel at all buildings early in the mornings to work on clearing acres of parking lots and sidewalks.

All of these factor into the final determination of whether a school delay or eLearning Day is needed. If there is a determination to change the school day, we plan to make the all-call to our staff and families as well as media notification prior to 6:00a.m. Only in the case of rapidly changing conditions would a decision be made later.

The new protocols also include the shipment of COVID-19 rapid tests to be administered by school nurses in circumstances such as someone exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms. The IDOH has not given a delivery date to schools at this time.

The IDOH has pledged to provide schools with additional information "soon." As this information is received, it will be shared with our families. Please be aware that no changes will occur until specific guidelines are received from state and county health officials.

COVID-19 Screening for Parents

Every morning before you send your child to school please check for signs of illness:



- *May present with more than one symptom. This list does not include all possible symptoms.
- Does your child have any sign of illness above?
- Were you in close contact (within 6 feet for more than 15 minutes) with anyone confirmed with COVID-19?

headache, especially with fever

- If the answer is **YES** to any of the questions, **DO NOT** send your student to school. Instead, begin isolation of your child and contact your healthcare provider. Have you been tested for COVID-19? Only a positive test or provider diagnosis can confirm if someone has a current infection.
- Please keep your student home until they meet the criteria on the chart on back of the page.
- If you have trouble breathing, chest pain, new confusion, inability to wake or stay awake or bluish lips or face

Please alert the school office if absent due to COVID-related reasons for attendance coding purposes. Students may take part in virtual school during quarantine.

In addition to the above, do not attend school if:

- You are awaiting COVID-19 test results.
- Any member of the household has tested positive or is awaiting test results due to exposure/symptoms.
- Any member of the household is home from work or school with COVID-19 symptoms.

If a person is at home for any of the above reasons, the person should stay at home until Indiana State Department of Health Return to School guidance is met. When in doubt, stay home and contact your school nurse or the Morgan County Health Department (765-342-6621) for guidance.
